Entertaining yarn - without a twist

HINDLE WAKES - Talisman Theatre, Kenilworth, until Saturday. Running time: 3 hr.
Stanley Houghton's Hindle Wakes is a tale straight from Lancashire and the early 1900s.

The death of a young girl in Blackpool leads to the discovery of grave affairs for the small town of Hindle during Wakes week, the old northern equivalent of the Coventry fortnight.

The wonderful cast brings a story of straight-living and sexual equality to life at the Talisman and gives the audience plenty of laughs. Just one set change at the beginning makes for a slow pace at times although the talented actors make sure the speed soon picks up and never leaves you bored.

That's one small criticism and one caused by a writer who died 91 years ago rather than the able cast.

My only other criticism is the

lack of the billed twist.

One hundred years ago, when Hindle
Wakes was written, the twist would
have been shocking and surprising, but
in these days of sexual equality,
promisculty and "sin," the twist was
predictable from the start.
Maybe that's a shame but it takes
nothing away from an otherwise
entertaining yarn. - Jeanette Scott
