## Another belter from the

Filumena by Eduardo de Filippo, at the Talisman Theatre until tomorrow

Talisman Theatre until temerrow (Saturday), Box office: B\$6548, FILUMENA tells the tale of the tempestuous relationship between resourceful former prostitute (Vicki Hollings in the title role) and her faithless lover of 20 years and wealthy confectioner Domenico (John Fenner).

It's billed as a comedy with a more serious undercurrent, and the Talisman's brisk, moving and morally intriguing rendition ticked both boxes in style on Mondaynight.

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Sick of her master's philander-ing, the wily weman tricks Domenice into a deathbed mar-riage, prompting a strong start to this excellent Talisman rendition as Hollings excellent Filumena makes a 'miraculous' recovery, ver-

bally shreds the flabbergasted Domenico in a hilarious domestic with plenty of low blows and terrifies Diana (Emily Morris), the young mistress who has been waiting for her to pop her clogs so she can jump into her place.

It's some start, full of pacey Italian temperament and dialogue, and all credit to the Kenilworth theatre that the level of accomplishment rarely drops from that point on. Hollings and Fenner were particularly strong in the lead roles, backed by a full complement of stylish supports. Lorna Spenser's Rosalls, Nell Vallance's knackered ex-jockey Alfredo and James Weistenholme's caddish shop-owner Riceardo particularly well-realised.

Credit too for the a lush set worthy of Domenice's status, and a nod

to the Italian accent rather than a

to the Italian accent rather than a poor replication.

When Domenice turns to the law and has the union annulled, Filumena produces her trump eard - three grown-up sons, one of whom is Domenico's. The thing is, Filumena won't tell which is which one it is - and she uses that leverage to maximum effect.

The comedic element was well-executed, but it was the continual switching of audience sympathy from Filumena, who at first appears a gold-digger to Domenico, far from without his own faults, and back which makes the piece absorbing - and the resolution genuinely meving. A complete change of gear from the frothy fun of Dames at Sea, but a second belter in a row from the Talisman.

A GOOD storyline blended with a strong cast, comedy moments and colourful scenery creates the perfect recipe for success for this Eduardo de Filippo play. Set in 1930s Naples, the
