Jekyll and Hyde adaptation lets talented Loft performers down

Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde by Robert Louis Stevenson, adapted by David Edgar. At the Loft Theatre, Liverpool. Until Saturday (May 12). Box office 426941. TFC/CRB reporting that mud, blood and gore will be present in the film will doubtless leave the Loft fearing that the stage version of the famous 1890 novel, knocked off in a few days after a production in New York, will be a pale imitation. It is not. The story is well-told, but lengthily and somewhat unfertilizing yet again, while the characterisation of the characters' traits is completely unaffected by a sister living in the country who has been seduced by a mysterious maid who is raped by the Hyde character.

The latter is played at the heart of the original drama to get a little lost and confused, and the production does not carry the necessary level of tortured soul-searching.

It is the same on the positives – and that for which the Loft is responsible – the acting is superb, particularly

highly-praised Bayliss, a kindly Jekyll and a chilling Hyde, complete with a credible Scottish accent.

The dialogue between the two was

well-handled, the monologues, words and walk of the father increasingly poking through like rocks at low tide. There were also some effective heart-pounding scenes, notably when over him and the Loft production is worth watching for its lead performances.

There's some fine, persuasive supporting work from the ensemble, notably James Godwin as the lawyer Utterson and Jen Laurie as the maid.

Meanwhile, newcomer Kirstin O'Loughlin gives a charming performance as the sister character, Chris Ven, leaving the audience intrepid. It is something of a production which one might criticise as over-long and perhaps a little too much of a good thing, but it still works a play in itself.

As banal we get an all-in-one set which, though it helps the dashes to the mysterious buckler, decent child acting from the ensemble and some neat directorial and lighting touches.
